The basic education department said in the document that there would also be just 13 days of school holidays between now and the end of the year, excluding public holidays.

According to the gazette, the new school terms are:

term 1: Jan 15 – March 18;

term 2: June 8 (postponed from June 1) – August 7;

term 3: August 12 - September 23; and

term 4: October 5 – December 15."

"The government has recently moved from a strict lockdown to a differential risk-adjusted model of alert levels.

The five risk-adjusted levels are guided by a set of criteria. These include the level of infections and rate of transmission, the capacity of health facilities, the implementation of public health interventions and economic and

social impact. Built into the model is the possibility of a differentiated approach to deal with those areas that have far higher levels of infection and transmission. Decision makers in the Department of Health say they are currently implementing what is practical and implementable. This, it's envisaged, would be done in a way that's "coherent and aligned to many factors". The question is: why are ordinary citizens not involved in decisions about what is practical and implementable, coherent and aligned?"

SA Government News Agency. Cabinet considers recommendations regarding Level 3.

"Cabinet, at its ordinary meeting on Wednesday, has received an updated report from the National Coronavirus Command Council (NCCC).

The NCCC tabled several recommendations about the enhanced risk-adjusted alert level 3 of the national lockdown. South Africa entered level 3 lockdown on 01 June 2020.

South Africa's infection rate increased by 2 430 to 55 421 on Wednesday, as the country ramps up testing for COVID-19. The country has tested close to a million people, an increase of 30 330 tests in the past 24 hours.

Cabinet decided to defer approval of the recommendations pending a full health assessment report from the Ministerial Health Advisory Committee on COVID-19.

The NCCC is expected to receive the full presentation by early next week."

"A 29-year-old male has appeared at the Ngcobo Magistrates Court on charges of contravening the Disaster Management Act regulations. ... "During the execution of a search warrant at Ebumnandini Hardware, which also operates as a supermarket, the following successes were achieved.

"One male suspect, aged 29 years, was arrested after he was found selling tobacco. He was also found in possession of a firearm, a magazine and several rounds of ammunition," the South African Police Service (SAPS) said on Wednesday.

The application will be heard at 10am, said the DA spokesperson on trade and industry, Dean Macpherson.

The DA approached the court this week to have the ban set aside, arguing that it is irrational and unconstitutional.”

Cele, S'thembile. Government considering opening cinemas during level 3.

“Minister of trade, industry and competition Ebrahim Patel has handed a lifeline to the cinema industry. In newly gazetted amendments to regulations, he says he is also mulling over the possibility of opening cinemas. Amongst the amendments is the announcement that earlier directives on what kinds of clothing and bedding could be sold - which caused a controversy – have now lapsed, meaning that all types of items can now be sold. Directives on workplace protocols at call centres and car repair centres, as well as regarding the sale of cars, have been withdrawn and replaced with directives issued by minister of employment and labour Thulas Nxesi last week. Patel has also eased restrictions on some medications, which under previous regulations required a permit to purchase. This was done in order to allow the government to procure medicines needed in the fight against the coronavirus.”
